# **Course Information**

#### **Catalog Description:**

Spanish history, with an emphasis on cultural, intellectual, and artistic trends and existing social institutions. Prerequisite: SPAN 2314 or SPAN 2315 with a grade of C or better.

## **Section Description:**

This course will examine the many cultures of Spain through a thematic design. Students will study literary and historical texts, art, music, film, and architecture, among other sources, to understand various manifestations of culture in the Iberian Peninsula from the Middle Ages to the present. Students will learn to critically analyze texts, objects, geographical spaces, architecture, music, film, and art, along with the stereotypes related to "Spanish identity" through the ages.

# **Student Learning Outcomes:**

- Identify major historical periods, key topics, and historical actors important to Spanish
  Peninsular culture through engagement with period sources (non-fiction, literature, film,
  music, art, architecture, etc.), classroom discussion, and tests.
- Apply close-reading strategies to literary and cultural texts through homework, classroom exercises, and written assignments.
- Draw connections between cultural artifacts (documents, films, stories, architecture, art, geographical spaces, etc.) and cultural and historical problems relating to Spain's history through classroom discussion, tests, and formal paper assignments.
- Practice reading and writing skills in Spanish through homework and writing assignments.
- Engage with the FabLab through the design and creation of original objects that critically engage with Spanish culture.

• Utilize project management skills to plan, organize and pace a group project designed to educate their classmates on a topic or text.

# **Descriptions of major assignments and examinations:**

Class Preparation and Participation: Class attendance is mandatory since you must attend class in order to participate. If a student misses more than THREE (3) days, he/she will be penalized for each absence above that limit.

It is the student's responsibility to come prepared for class. To do this, the student must check the syllabus and read Canvas announcements daily. Active participation is a fundamental part of the class. It is expected that the student complete all his/her homework, written exercises, and assigned work for each day of class. Late arrivals or leaving the class during the class period will affect your final attendance and participation grade.

#### Examinations (2)

The examinations will be open notebook and will cover the primary materials studied inside and outside of class, as well as the class lectures. Students may use any handwritten notes for the exam. No printed materials can be used, included PowerPoints and primary texts. Dates assigned to exams on the syllabus will be observed strictly. NO MAKE-UP EXAMINATIONS WILL BE GIVEN, unless acceptable reason such as a family emergency, documented illness (medical or official written excuse from an academic dean required for both), or participation in an approved official college activity (notification and documentation required two weeks in advance).

**N.B.:** The exams will cover the material in the readings and class activities, in addition to any supplementary materials from class. There will be no make-up exams.

#### FabLab Project (1)

Student will connections between cultural artifacts (documents, films, stories, etc.) and cultural and historical problems relating to Spain's history through the creation of an object in the FabLab. The process of planning and completing the Fab Lab Project will involve a series of steps. Due dates indicated on the syllabus will be strictly observed.

# Journal Entries (Diarios) (5)

Each student will write a series of 5 journal entries, responding to the question prompts provided by the professor. These journal entries will be critical reflections on the process of planning and completing a project in conjunction with the FabLab. These reflection pieces will be graded for grammar, style, and content.

# Project Proposal (1)

Each individual or group will write a proposal for the FabLab Project. The Proposal will answer the following questions:

- What is the cultural or historical problem?
- What is the object you will create?
- How does the project align with the learning outcomes for the course?
- What are the benefits for the user?
- What is the timeframe, what are the deadlines and how do you plan to meet them?
- What are the resources you'll need to get the project done on time?
- What's the project budget?
- What are the risks and issues?
- Who are the people responsible for the project and what are their roles?

#### Oral Presentation (1)

Students will give one oral presentation on their FabLab Project. These will be programmed in Week 12. The grade will be based on the following elements: language (grammar, vocabulary, etc.), creativity, clarity and accuracy. More instructions will be provided in class.

## Final Reflection Paper (1)

Students will write a critical reflection paper on their final FabLab Project. The grade will be based on the following elements: language (grammar, vocabulary, etc.), organization, and content. More instructions will be provided in class.

The dates for homework and exams can be modified slightly throughout the course, depending on various factors. All changes will be announced well in advance.

#### Attendance:

At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator of student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this section, I have established the attendance policy described above (see "Attendance and participation: I take attendance on a daily basis, and students are assigned a daily participation grade, which is factored in the

"Attendance and participation" portion of the final grade. Any absence above TWO (one full week of class) will negatively impact this portion of the grade.

However, while UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report must the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Canvas. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

Attached is a syllabus for the entire term indicating the readings, assignments, exams, deadlines for papers, etc. You are responsible for preparing all lessons BEFORE class and for looking up and learning unfamiliar vocabulary. Do not hesitate to talk to the professor if you have doubts, questions or comments. Do not wait until the day of the exam or the last week of classes to discuss the material or your performance in the course.

<u>Studying:</u> To succeed in this course you must develop a habit of studying every night. First, this will enhance your ability to participate in class discussions, as well as your overall participation grade. Second, consistent engagement is the only way to improve your language skills. Third, if you are not consistent in your study practices, you will find yourself in the unfortunate position of having to cram for your tests, or hastily write your compositions and other homework, both of which often yield poor results.

Reading: You cannot understand the whole text after a single reading. Read the text a first time to get a general

idea of its meaning. Then, read the text a second time. Use the dictionary for the words you do not understand. Learn these new words and significant expressions that will enable you to retell and discuss the text. Read the text several times until you are able to answer questions on it and summarize it in your own words without looking at it. If you are not sure whether you have indeed understood the material, make notes and bring your specific questions to class (in all likelihood, other students in class will have similar questions!). It is your responsibility to make sure that you master the material. Please discuss with the professor opportunities for extra help (from her and/or a tutor) if you feel you need it. Again, please do not wait until the day before the exam or too close to the end of the term to ask for help.

#### Leaving class during the class period:

Please avoid this practice except in cases of extreme emergency. If this becomes a habit, it risks being calculated as a late arrival, and will affect the final participation grade.

#### Cell phones:

Class time is precious, and I ask you to turn off all cell phones upon entering the classroom. If your cell phone rings or if I find you texting, I reserve the right to ask you to leave for the day. You will be counted absent for that day.
