I have been greatly disturbed of late

him the voluntary gifts - presents by my  
friends in Tampeco: contrary to the intent and  
desire of the donors - charging me - as doing  
wrong in receiving them - which I most fully  
disputed - I submit the matter to my friends  
whether they will not in justice to me - and  
their own - generously - solve - send me an order  
as above - if they will - I shall instantly be  
exonerated from the charge - and the gifts  
restored, through my friends - It was the first  
gift of each gentleman - and I am ~~sick~~ <sup>sure</sup> they

They - will not see me suffer - descend - for accepting  
what they - had a right to offer or refuse at  
will - The same is asked of all the gentlemen  
is - Mr. Labourer & LaLasree - on Order to my  
Agent. John P. Lord New York - \$ 500 -  
on. Wm Morey - McTolly also. \$ 500 -  
Mr. Malicus & Maspoole & c. - 400 -  
W<sup>r</sup>. Clarendon & Gibbs & c. - 750 -

Each of them giving the order  
as a restoration of the gift - which  
has been - taken from me - by superior author-  
ity - who. declares. I am not. at liberty to  
receive such presents - To this I answer  
stately - More persons were private gentleman  
not. "Kings, Friends, or potentates" <sup>personages</sup> ~~but~~ the con-  
stitution - refers to - which does not apply to me  
in this case - The Hon<sup>r</sup> Sec<sup>r</sup> thinks I have violated
